NEW COMPUTER SYSTEM FOR LHS

One of the toughest and most persistent problems facing any museum is keeping track of its collections including artifacts, photographs, research resources etc. This has been a particular thorn in our side because our 8-10 year old Macintosh computer is filled to capacity and will accept no more information. For that reason your Board of Directors decided we must have dramatically increased capacity. The only way to do this is with a new computer system.

So.....we have purchased a Hewlett Packard Media Center 7690 Desktop Computer. It includes a 1 GIG Random Access Memory, 400 GB 7200 RPM Hard Drive, 300 GB Personal Media Drive for backup, DVD Burner and Recorder, 256 Video Card, 19" Monitor and Windows XP Operating System.

Folks, this is all so foreign to me. But directors Sonny Miller, Terry Clark and Connie Andrews are very computer literate and they put this package together with great help from Barn Coordinator, Becky Emmerich.

But we're not finished. We've purchased a program called File Pro 8.5 which will transfer the 30,000 items in the old Mac system to the new one with no physical inputting required. The old computer contained 50% to 70% of what we own. The new system will absorb that and the rest of our holdings with more than enough capacity for the foreseeable future.

But that's not all. On the recommendation of the Johnson County Museum we've purchased a program called Past Perfect 4.0. This will connect us with all the museums in the area PLUS about 15,000 more across the country. We will be able to access their collections as they will ours. Is this not incredible? My friends, we are taking our place in the big leagues of the American museum scene.

In addition to all of this we have a new HP 7410 all in one printer, scanner, fax and copier. It's capable of reading camera cards from digital cameras and prints two sides on both letter and legal size.

This beautiful system and the new copier described elsewhere in this newsletter were made possible by a \$5,000 gift from the Legler Barn Quilters a few years ago. The use to which this gift was devoted was paying outside contract help to get our materials into the system. But, as pointed out, the system filled up so we were stymied. And there was about \$4,300 left in the account. The addition of about \$1,200 of Society funds enabled us to do all this. The Lenexa Historical Society expresses tremendous gratitude to our beloved quilters.


"Round Up" of Volunteers for Lenexa's 100th Year Celebration.

Wilbert (Sonny) Miller, Jr. is treasurer for the Lenexa Historical Society.

Hi, my name is Wilbert W. "Sonny" Miller, Jr. My life began and probably will finish on 87th Street. I was born and raised in our old home place on 87th in Overland Park and we now have returned to my wife Judy's old home place (the bog stone house on the hill) in Lenexa. My great, great grandfather was Lemuel Nall, a brother to John Nall, Jr. who was early settlers in Johnson County. The Nall family is buried along with the Wash White Indian family at the Highland Cemetery at 5000 W. 65th St. in Prairie Village, KS.



I grew up working in my father's sheet metal shop and continued on in the mechanical construction industry—moving to West Des Moines, Tampa, Florida and New Orleans, Louisiana for 30 years of my career. I attended Overland Park Grade School and Shawnee Mission Rural High School.

One of my childhood memories was my grandmother's grape vineyards that I had to hoe and where I had to pick many, many grapes. I also helped my grandmother cut and gather the peonies she would sell to her many customers for Memorial Day. My brother and I practiced baseball in the cow pasture at 95th and Antioch. Ed Bowman's dad was our American Legion baseball coach and we played at Segner Field at 87th and Grant. I would go on many coon hunts with my Dad. My favorite old Uncle Marvin would take me fishing to the Lake of the Ozarks where we would fish for hours not noticing that the mosquitoes were eating us alive and sometimes we'd get lost in the fog. We'd survive on Spam and Vienna sausages – but what an adventure for a 12 yr. old boy.

My wife and I were high school sweethearts. We have 3 grown children – a married daughter in West Des Moines, a son in Mainz, Germany and our youngest son in Gardner who married a German girl from Mainz. We have 5 grandchildren, three girls and two boys, ages 19, 16, 6, 4, and 1. Our oldest granddaughter just began her first year at Iowa University.

I've "come home" to Lenexa. I have so many fond memories of watching movies on a Friday night in Old Town Lenexa. They were projected on the wall of the old fire station. My mother would drive us across the 87th street bridge to visit the Belgian truck farmer stands along old Kansas City Road (Quivira) where we would buy our onion, tomato and pepper sets to start our home garden each Spring. I could hear the old steam engines and the clickity-clack of their wheels and the train's steam whistles echoed in the night. A few hobos would get off the trains and stop by homesteads to ask for a meal. My grandmother knew one certain hobo who she would hire to prune her grape vines because she was very particular how it had to be done. Then she would furnish him a good meal for his labor.

Congratulations Lenexa! I'm so proud of our city and so proud of our history. I want to wish you a very happy 100th Birthday!!


